## How I chose the books

I've had many guestions about how I chose the books for Excellence in Literature, so I wrote a nice, long explanation of all the factors that went into the final decisions. As you can guess, it wasn't easy to sort through centuries of great literature to end up with 45 focus texts and about 45 honors texts, balanced between novels, drama, and epic poetry. It was fun, though— what a great excuse to read and read and read! Here are some of the guestions I considered when choosing what to include:

- Is this work foundational to an understanding of Western Civilization and culture?
- Is it a classic work that is regularly alluded to in current conversation (including newspaper, radio, books, movies, etc.)?
- Does it tell the truth about life and consequences?
- Is there something compelling about this particular work that makes it, more than another, deserve a place in the curriculum?
- Does it offer a unique perspective on the culture of its time and place?
- Does it have the power to engage readers and cause them to think deeply about important issues?
- Is it well-written?
- Has it endured the test of time?
